## (ii) Food for thought.

### 'One thing'.

- (i) Desired: communion with God (Psa. 27. 4).
- (ii) Shared in common: physical death (Eccl. 3. 19).
- (iii) Lacking: conversion (Mark 10. 21).
- (iv) Needful: a listening ear (Luke 10. 39, 42).
- (v) Known: personal testimony and assurance (John 9. 25).
- (vi) *Pursued*: a focus on spiritual progress (Phil. 3. 13).

## Evidences of the deity of Christ in John chapters 1 to 3.
